Ideas for Checking-In Your Kids

As a mom, I have seen the different reactions that my children have had as they have entered various classrooms at church and school. I have had the spectrum of reactions from one child who could walk into any classroom and be content from an early age to children who have been more timid with the acclimation to new places and people.

Now, as a preschool teacher, I am often asked what are the best ways to drop off a child in my classroom by the parents of little ones who may have a difficult time entering. There are many reasons that a child might be timid to leave their parent: anxiety without the parent, more timid to warm up to new environments, or the child doesn't like change, etc. But, there are some standard ways that we, as parents, can aid our children as they come into any classroom whether it is in a school or in our church.

- Prepare your child prior to coming in the building that you are dropping him/her off and that you will pick up your child as soon as the class is over. Make sure you do as you have said and return promptly as they will learn that you will do as you have said in the future.
- Make sure you know the protocol of how to check in your child so that the process is streamlined and there is little confusion at the door.
- I'm a firm believer of the "Band-aid" method this is my terminology for making the goodbye quick and painless. Just as band-aids hurt less when pulled off quickly rather than slowly, leaving quickly rather than lingering in the classroom allows the teacher to step in and help the child transition to his/her class.
- This is not to say that you can't say goodbye. Smile at your child and tell them you will return. Hug/kiss them, just make sure this process is not long as it can create more anxiety in the child. (1 minute should be sufficient)
- Trust the teachers that God has put into place in our church. These women and men are trained to care for and teach our children.

I hope these tips help each of you as parents or teachers to help our children feel confident and ready to learn more about our Savior in our classrooms!
